Title: LNG's fading promise

To the judges:

The promise of an LNG industry remains mostly a dream in Canada: there is currently only one terminal under construction to export liquefied natural gas in this country despite years of visionary pronouncements by governments and industry.

Reporter Brent Jang has been covering the sector since its Canadian beginnings and has developed excellent sources that have allowed him to share with readers an inside look at the glacial progress towards making the dream a reality. He has documented the challenges faced on both coasts, producing a major feature and several exclusive stories that, together, offer readers an inside look at the still-nascent industry.

In an overview piece [this spring](#), Brent travelled to Squamish and explained how a mountain stands in the way of Woodfibre LNG. He used that imagery to underscore the costly logistical problems that have thwarted or delayed LNG projects and related pipeline proposals.

The piece was informed by earlier reporting Brent did about [the obstacles faced by FortisBC](#) and Woodfibre LNG near Squamish.

Still, despite the challenges, Brent's reporting highlighted the optimism that still exists for the riches that an LNG industry might bring.

In exclusive coverage, Brent broke the story about the Nisga'a Nation combining with Rockies LNG on a [huge proposal](#) in northwest B.C. He also reported [on Shell eyeing a major expansion](#) of its Kitimat terminal currently under construction
